Douk-Douk is a very simple slipjoint knife, having no locking mechanism, but only a very strong backspring to bias it towards opening and closure.

- 1. A folded sheet-metal handle, which is very slim, has a strong backspring.
- 2. A <u>carbon steel</u> blade, of a soft and easily sharpened steel, generally of the "<u>Turkish clip</u>" profile reminiscent of a scimitar. The blade has indentations at the back, and is decorated with acid-engraved <u>arabesques</u>. The blade has no nail-nick, but is easily grasped for opening since it tapers at the spine.
- 3. Two rivets: one to hold the blade, the other to hold the backspring and bail. A metal bail or lanyard loop.

The cutlery firm of M.C. Cognet has continued to produce the knife up to the present day, using the same simple methods. Today they are offered with several decorative designs, stainless or carbon steel blades, in three different sizes.
